

Term: Autumn 2021 Year 2

Here are some ideas for homework you can do with your child at home. This term please pick 3 or 4 projects to complete. Send your work back into school by Friday 19th November.

English theme:	Maths theme:
Interview a relative from an older generation, record changes they have seen where they grew up. Imagine you are on holiday in London. Write a postcard to your friends or family at home to tell them all about it. Write a diary entry about the Great Fire of London. What adjectives (describing words) could you use to describe a fire? Draw a fire and write adjectives around the flames.	Visit a local shop with your grown up, hand over your money and work out your change. Look at the numbers of the houses in your street. Can you write down the even numbers? Can you write down the odd numbers? Time how long your journey home from school takes by counting or using a clock.
Art theme:	Topic theme:
Look in detail at the outside of your house and make a careful observational drawing. Draw and label a design for your own fantasy home. What will your home be built from? How will you get in and out of your house?	Visit your local museum, such as Preston Hall or Dorman Museum. What can you find out about the past? What can you find out about fire fighters? Make a poster about them.
Experiment mixing paints to create different shades of red, orange and yellow. Create a picture using fiery colours. Use paint, pastels, chalk, felt tips, paper or fabric.	London is the capital of England. Can you find out some information about the capital cities of the other countries in the UK?
